I. INTRODUCTION

Emmaus Europe was created on 21 May 2005 and is a not-for-profit organisation bringing together all the Emmaus groups from Europe alongside the Emmaus groups from Africa, America and Asia. Emmaus Europe has 260 member groups in 16 European countries.

It is essential for Emmaus to speak with one voice in Europe due to the economic, political and cultural influence of the European Union in today's world. This desire to speak with one voice is also inspired by a key issue for our organisation - the inclusion of human rights in all European policies - which is only just starting to happen.

The socio-economic situation in the Europe region deteriorated compared with 2007.

The financial crisis has seen the European Union hampered by the institutions' failure to act (the ratification of the Treaty of Lisbon has been postponed until the end of 2009).

Regarding the issue of migration, there has been a major step backwards in terms of legislation. The outrageous directive passed by the European Parliament and the European pact on immigration promoted by the French EU presidency are two clear examples of this trend.

The end of 2009 is a good moment to focus on the past two years in order to gain some perspective and look back.

2008, just like the previous years, was a year requiring careful management by Emmaus Europe. However, it was also a key year for the organisation. For the first time Emmaus Europe did not have to be managed in an emergency context due to the support of the member groups and European groups paying their membership fees on time. This enabled a calmer ethos to be applied to the running of the secretariat and the Europe Region.

II. LIFE OF THE REGION : activities and actions taken by Emmaus in the region.

The Europe region has developed considerably. **There are still shortcomings and areas in which progress is needed. However, we wish to take the opportunity to thank the European groups and all those who have give up their time to serve and built together a Europe based on the values of Emmaus.**

2008 was marked by the move in May to the joint headquarters in Montreuil, Seine Saint Denis. We took part in the inauguration of the joint headquarters on 26 September 2008.

The recruitment of a second member of staff as an admin-finance assistant in January enabled the secretariat to progress certain tasks for which it holds responsibility. This was particularly the case for the setting-up of an operational EE accounts system.

The SEE consistently and actively worked giving each elected representative the support that s/he rightfully expects, despite a handover and change of coordinator and assistant in September 2009.

A) Regional coordination 2008/2009

Developing coordination. A twin-pronged objective for Emmaus Europe : be involved in training and informing everyone, groups and bodies, and encourage debate.

Some key moments for European elected representatives.

The region really got down to work organising and taking part in a large number of statutory meetings. Two Regional Council meetings were held –in Alfortville in March and in Montreuil in October 2008. A regional council was also held in March 2009 and was preceded by a training day for the European elected representatives.

The EE Regional Executive met the 4 times in 2008, in Alfortville, Brussels (Belgium) and Montreuil. In addition to these meetings, two teleconferences were held by the members of the Regional Executive. In 2009, the Regional Executive met four times including one meeting at Emmaus Bougival (Paris region).

The EE Regional Executive met the Emmaus France Board and presented the Europe region at the Emmaus France General Assembly in May 2008.

In 2009, the members of the Emmaus France board were invited for an hour-long discussion with the members of the Regional Council of Emmaus Europe on 20 March. The aim of the meeting was to discuss the Brussels Regional Assembly of Emmaus Europe, which is a key event for the region.

At the subsequent **Emmaus France general assembly** held in **May 2009**, the international EF elected representatives presented the participatory regional assembly preparation method in a fun way. It was decided to prepare for the assembly in advance in order to collect the opinions, contributions and viewpoints of each French group, who are stakeholders in the life of the movement, on the themes in question. Working groups were set up at the meeting and discussed the seven sub-themes that form the basis for the discussion at the regional assembly.



The members of the Regional Executive and the SEE coordinator visited Emmaus groups or friends of Emmaus in Poland, Bosnia, Romania, France, Belgium, Portugal, Italy, Nederland and Ukraine. These visits were part of increased coordination work or part of an increased work programme for support and information, and producing documents promoting solidarity initiatives.

In this way, Emmaus Europe monitored and supported the work of the Collectives, responding to requests for support and information, and producing documents promoting solidarity initiatives.

Meetings were held in 2008 :

Bosnia Collective on 21 March in Alfortville (France). 2 meetings of the Poland/ Ukraine Collective: on 21 May in Lublin (Poland) and 14 November à Krakow (Poland). Romania Collective : 15 March in Iasi (Romania).

Other meetings were held in 2009:

Bosnia Collective: 16 January in Montreuil (France). Romania Collective: 14 February in Montreuil (France). Poland / Ukraine Collective: 13-14 April in Lviv (Ukraine).

The region's European representatives also took part in the two World Councils (WCPAIS in February 2008 Alfortville (France) and February 2009 in Haartbeespoort (South Africa), and the WCTNG in October 2008 in Lisbon, Portugal.

Others key moments ...in 2008 and 2009

- Took part in the meeting of the Emmaus Paris Association solidarity committee.
- Took part in the meeting of the Emmaus France solidarity committee (November).
- The President of Emmaus Europe and the SEE coordinator travelled for the first time to the head office of Banca Etica in Padua in Italy to meet Emmaus Europe's key partner.
- Took part in the international *Find Out About International Solidarity Day* organised by Emmaus International (04/12/08).
- Took part in the monthly regional secretariat meetings that have been organised by Emmaus International since December 2008.
- Srebrenica (Bosnia) youth camp review meeting (6 December 2008)
- Took part in the youth camps preparatory meeting (February 2009) organised by Emmaus France.
- Took part in the meeting of the EF community section (March 2009).
- The SEE delivered several Emmaus Europe presentations to European groups and circulated documents setting out proposed solidarity initiatives needing support.

The Emmaus Europe quiz - discussions on Emmaus Europe in each Emmaus France region

Following a meeting with the Emmaus France college of regions, the **French EI and EE elected representatives**¹ met on 6 November 2008 and decided to offer French groups an information session with a view to making the workings and initiatives of Emmaus Europe and Emmaus International more accessible. The French elected representatives and the SEE ran sessions at **regional meetings: Region 2 on 26 November 2008 in Fougères, Paris Region on 9 December 2008 in Montreuil, Region 3 on 11 December 2008 in Le Mans, Region 10 on 11 December 2008 in Roanne, on 12 March 2008 in Pau, Region 6 on 23 June 2009 in Amiens and Region 7 on 18 June 2009 in Courthézon.**

Participants were given a sheet presenting EE at the end of the meetings. The resource was called the *Emmaus Europe Quiz*.

Training and companion, leader and volunteer exchange programmes

Four European representatives from the World Council on Training and New Generations reflected together on the theme of training and the issue of new generations. They put forward initiatives to be carried out within the framework of Emmaus Europe. 2008 saw the organisation of the **first training course** open to all leaders of European Emmaus groups. The course was held in Ferrara, Italy, from 10-23 May 2008, and focused on one of EE's priority issues - ***"Migration and migration policies: what are the issues at stake for Emmaus?"***

Two training courses were held in 2009.

1. Emmaus Europe and water (6-9 April at Emmaus Europe HQ in Montreuil, France)



The European members of the world council proposed an *Emmaus Europe and water* training course in conjunction with one of the 2007 World Assembly priority action areas – **water access for all** – and the October 2008 Lisbon work camp on **Emmaus and participatory sustainable development**. They decided to focus on the political, economic and environmental facets of the issue.

2. Exchanges of practice between European community leaders (22-25 June in Montreuil, France)

Emmaus was created by people joining together, so the question must be asked, can Emmaus Europe be consolidated by people coming together? Meeting gives us the chance to get to know each other but primarily it is the chance to recognise each other as members of the same solidarity movement that is fighting the root causes of exclusion.

While seeking to leave room for local initiatives linked to the mutual history of individual groups, the aim of the course was to give these exchanges a helping hand and encourage a discussion process between community leaders in the first instance. This two-and-a-half day meeting enabled the participants to share experiences and different visions of Emmaus.



The Solidarity Salon

Emmaüs Paris Salon.

A large number of European groups took part in the 2008 Paris Salon. The following European countries were among those who took part: Switzerland, Belgium, Italy, Poland and Ukraine, Romania, Germany, the UK and the Netherlands. **The Europe Region had a stand at the event presenting European initiatives and undertakings.**

2009 was the year of the 10th Emmaus Salon. Emmaus Europe was represented by the many European groups who made the journey to Paris to exhibit the wonders of their countries and by elected representatives on an information stand. Information on the work of Emmaus Europe, the region's story to date, the roadmap and member groups was available.

The stand was another new way of making Emmaus Europe's voice heard and raising the public's awareness about our goal of building a Europe based on the values of Emmaus.

The Europe Region also had a stand presenting its work and commitments at the third regional salon (Alsace-Lorraine-Champagne-Ardennes). The salon was held from 12-13 September 2009 in Charleville Mézières.


The Europe Region attended the **Emmaus Italy** national salon in which European groups also took part. The salon was held from 25-27 September 2009 in Turin.

Improving communication within Emmaus Europe.

▪ **Launch of the Emmaus Europe website**

2008 was punched by discussions between the SEE, the graphic designer and site developer about the graphics for the Emmaus Europe website. The site's development proved to be the subject of many discussions. Marked differences in the RCEE about the way in which the EE Regional Executive managed to deal with, leading to a compromise enabling the site to be launched on 1 January 2009.

The website was launched on 1 January 2009 slightly over a year after the Strasbourg Regional Assembly (August 2007) had requested a website for the Europe Region. The website aims to improve communication between the groups and Emmaus Europe and between the groups themselves.



A **directory of groups** can now be consulted via an interactive map of Europe, which shows the countries in which Emmaus works (section : Directory of groups). A **members' area** was created in order to meet internal communications requirement. In addition, a forum was launched and is issued for discussions between member

groups and elected representatives about the issue of the Emmaus Europe logo.

The groups and the general public can also select a month in the **main events of the year** section to find out about Emmaus Europe events.

Maria Fajardo, who was on an internship at Emmaus Europe during the first half of 2009, was responsible for regularly adding content to the site and worked in a determined and conscientious fashion.

Emmaus Europe wants to continue developing this communications resource over the coming years while diversifying and increasing the number of pages offered to the Emmaus groups.

B) Regional solidarity

In 2008, regional solidarity was based on economic, resource and HR support provided by many of the groups. A European solidarity programme and a European container programme were developed for 2008.

• **European container programme**

The SEE acts as an interface for the EE groups that have made requests for resources and those willing to send containers. Therefore, the secretariat monitored and collected information throughout 2008. *In 2008, 42 containers travelled across Europe!* All of these solidarity initiatives are managed by the Collective responsible for the country in question in conjunction with the Emmaus Europe Regional Executive and secretariat.

• **Convoys**

As in previous years, as part of the European international youth camp held in Bosnia in summer 2008, a **convoy** was organised to transport goods **for the local population**. Made up of **five to ten heavy goods vehicles** loaned and chartered by various communities, the convoy transported **furniture, clothing and all kinds of items**.

The European collectives: working groups responsible for regional solidarity

regional work in Eastern Europe continued through the four: Poland/Ukraine, Romania, Bosnia and the Migration and Human Trafficking Collective.

Initiatives that were given support were firstly analysed and prioritised by each Collective in which a European member of the World Council on Political Action and International Solidarity and contact person participate. The work of the Collectives sometimes came up against the problems that rise when working together. In 2008, the collectives centred their solidarity initiatives on a specific country using appeals for solidarity sent out by Emmaus Europe to all the European groups:



Bosnia Collective

- *Organisation of a European youth camp in Srebrenica and convoy.* Covered the living costs of the young participants and the costs of the convoy.
- *European community service centre for the population of Srebrenica :* Seeking funds so that a plot of land can be brought for this centre, which will offer social, economic, cultural and ecological activities.

Poland/Ukraine Collective

Emmaüs Rzeszów /Poland (trial member since April 2006, member since April 2009) : Seeking funding for the purchase of a plot of land on which the community house will be built, in order to improve companions' living conditions.

- *Emmaüs Lublin/Poland.* Seeking funds for the reconstruction of the carpentry workshop in order to complete the work and equip the workshop for the official opening of the social carpentry enterprise. Objective : achieve self-sufficiency via this project.

Achievements in 2009...

Bosnia Collective

- **Organisation of an international youth camp and goods convoy**

This initiative is an annual European event as part of the youth camp scheme. Take

- **Oselya Mutual Aid Community/Ukraine :**

1. *Seeking funds for the renovation of a rented building. Renovation of a rented building from 2008 onwards, following the loss of the former premises, which were put on sale by their owner.*
2. *Fund five employees' salaries in 2008.* Objective: contribute to the stability, management and organisation of the community by covering the wages of the people who run the group's activity.

Romania Collective

- **Emmaus Un coup de main in Iasi :** *Renovation of the outside of the community's accommodation.* Objective: Make the companions' living space more hygienic.
- **Carpentry workshop :** Initiative supported by Emmaüs International with funds from the takings of the 2007 solidarity sales donated by all the Movement's member groups. The premises and workshop have been fitted out. The SEE was responsible for monitoring, following up and evaluating these initiatives.

part in the reconstruction of the country. Improve the living conditions of the local population: water conveyance work, cleaning / clearing roads, helping families to renovate their houses.

▪ **Occupational therapy project (work-based rehabilitation) in Duje**

Enable those housed at the centre to take part in its economic development through their work.

Develop the centre's economic activity by involving the beneficiaries staying there. A regional initiative supported by Emmaus International for 2010.



Romania Collective

▪ **Emmaus Un Coup de Main Foundation**

in Iasi Purchase of a new vehicle for collecting and delivering goods.

Migration and human trafficking collective

This group works on the issue of migration and human trafficking as part of the development of Emmaus Europe's citizen initiatives.

During 2008, the collective mainly focused on projects and events **supporting migrants' rights.**

Emmaüs Europe was involved in several events over the course of the year :

2008: the campaign against the outrageous directive

▪ **Signed the joint appeal** : Emmaus Europe, along with Emmaus International and Emmaus France signed an appeal to members of the European parliament to reject the draft directive. (www.directivedelahonte.org).

▪ **Took part in the 7 May demonstration in Brussels** to protest against the adoption of this directive and the measures that it contains.

▪ **Joined the demonstration on 14 June in Paris**: Following the postponement of

Poland / Ukraine Collective

▪ **Oselya Mutual Aid Community / Ukraine**

Financial contribution to the running of the community in 2009

Contribute to the stability, management and organisation of the community by covering the wages of the people who run the group's activity.

▪ **Emmaus Brat Albert, Krakow.**

Construction of a house for the community on the outskirts of Krakow. Create stable working conditions and increase the residential capacity from 10 – 30 companions. Support the reintegration of homeless people into society. Consolidate Emmaus Krakow's economic activity. Build a workshop with the aim of improving the commercial facilities, currently leased to the town's authorities. A regional initiative supported by Emmaus International for 2010.

▪ **Monitoring the French Presidency of the European Union**

A joint Emmaus Europe and Emmaus France monitoring unit was set up due to France taking control of the EU Presidency. A newsletter was published every month during the second half of 2008: [1](#), [2](#), [3](#), [4](#), [5](#), [6 EUROPE](#).

One of its aims was to inform the European groups about the progress of the EU's work and its impact on the work of the groups.

▪ **Initiative part of the European development of citizen initiatives**

Work to combat human trafficking continued in 2008 with support being given to the **Missing persons' families support centre** prevention programme located in Vilnius in Lithuania.

The initiative aims to build the capacities of young girls via the use of the group method, give each at-risk girl the option of taking control of her life and promote gender equality and democracy.



C) The Europe Region's political work in 2009

Emmaus Europe continued to get involved in a large number of **initiatives** in order to **fight extreme poverty, the various forms of exclusion and their root causes in Europe**.

Questioning the EU elections candidates

Emmaus Europe appealed to the candidates at the 7 June 2009 European Parliament elections to create a socially responsible Europe respectful of human rights, which are the key values of the Emmaus Movement.

As part of this awareness raising initiative, Emmaus Europe reminded the candidates that the EU is still short on social rights for all those living on European soil.

Three issues were raised in the initial letter:

- Migrants' rights: "At Emmaus, we offer an unconditional welcome, so we want the rights of migrants to be respected."
- Poor housing and homelessness: "homelessness can be eradicated."
- The solidarity economy: "By collecting, recycling and selling second-hand goods, these structures also carry out social inclusion initiatives, as they employ people who are experiencing difficulties."

Having written to the EU Parliament elections candidates, **Emmaus Europe received around fifteen responses by post and email.**

Emmaus Europe is planning to follow these new MEPs throughout their period in office to keep them up to date with the movement's campaigns and to make the voice of Emmaus Europe heard. Emmaus Europe believes that it is necessary to fight to achieve the just objective of "first help those who suffer most" in our individualistic society.

Emmaus Europe is planning to meet these new MEPs and particularly those who will work on the following committees:

Committee on employment, social affairs and equal opportunities, committee on the environment, public health and food safety and the committee on civil liberties, justice and home affairs.

Indeed, Emmaus Europe's campaign is continuing beyond the elections, by focusing our efforts on these three committees in particular, as they study and work on issues that are closely linked to Emmaus Europe's key themes (migration policy and the right to asylum, poor housing and the solidarity economy). This is why our campaign targeting the MEPs must not and cannot stop here.

17 May 2009 event supporting migrants' rights

We want a different Europe from the one that is turning into a fortress and is implementing excessive measures to prevent access to its territory and deport undocumented migrants.



Emmaus Europe rejects the systematic use of detention centres and forced removal.

As a follow-up to the first "Bridges not Walls" conference and on the occasion of the European elections, Emmaus Europe called for people to attend an event from 3pm on Sunday 17 May 2009 in Place de Stalingrad in Paris.

The event was a celebratory gathering at which migrants spoke and talked about their personal experiences and also included a public debate.

Emmaus Europe got involved in order to make respect for justice, rights and human dignity the cornerstones of European migration policies once again.

Emmaus Europe also signed the Bridges not Walls advocacy document.

▪ **Network based working**

The general assemblies of the following networks were held in autumn 2008:

▪ **EAPN** : A European network of organisations involved in the fight against poverty and social exclusion (20 September en Bulgaria).

▪ **FEANTSA** : European federation of national organisations working with homeless. An organisation governed by Belgian law which works in an expert capacity with the European Commission.

Emmaus Europe was represented by Xavier Vandromme, a member of the World Council on Political Action and International Solidarity and a member of the Emmaus Paris Association (which is also a member of both these networks).

▪ **Summer volunteering scheme - the European Youth Camps**

Some of the communities in five European countries held **youth camps during summer 2008**. Camps were held in Germany, Belgium, Italy, Portugal and France. Several Italian and French companions also took part in a work camp during summer 2008 in Srebrenica in Bosnia.

These experiences proved to be very positive despite a drop in the number of young volunteers, which was disappointing.



In 2009, groups in **Spain, Bosnia, Belgium, Finland, France, Italy, Portugal** and **the UK** hosted work camps.

Links were included on the Emmaus Europe website in order to guide young people wishing

to take part in an Emmaus camp. They were able to obtain information about the camps in France and Italy by using this additional communications tool. Young Europeans were also able to obtain information about the camps at Emmaus Fraternidade in Lisbon (Portugal), La Poudrière (Belgium), Emmaus Åland (Finland), Emaus Murcia and Emaus San Sebastian (Spain), the International Solidarity Forum (Bosnia) and Emmaus Village Carlton (UK). 2009 also saw the organisation of the first ever youth camp in the UK. Emmaus Village Carlton hosted young Europeans from 29 June – 6 July 2009. The young people helped organise and promote a special sale to raise the profile of Emmaus and recycling.

III. DIFFICULTIES ENCOUNTERED

A range of difficulties were encountered in 2008 :

Communications :

- A lack of effective communications resources enabling all the groups to be informed about the work of Emmaus in Europe (this difficulty has been partially overcome since the launch of the website on 1 January 2009).
- Lack of Emmaus Europe presentation aids.

Solidarity :

- Starting-up the smooth running of some Collectives did not prove to be an easy task (particularly the Romania collective and the Migration and Human Trafficking Collective).
- Constraints in the Emmaus Europe –FAP relationship.

Administratif :

- Regarding the groups and specifically the national organisations, administrative and legal follow-up was not sufficiently supported.
- The admin-finance post being unoccupied in July 2008 (some work areas were put on hold until the arrival of the new member of staff).
- Regarding the organisation of the secretariat, adapting to the change of coordinator in September 2008.

New groups in the region: membership applications and new trial members

In 2008, the Europe Region monitored and informed four groups that are trial members (statutes and examining applications).



1. Växjö / Sweden (trial member since March 2007).
2. Oselya mutual aid community / Ukraine (trial member since 2008).
3. Burnley / UK (monitored by the UK national organisation).
4. Emmaus Feniks / The Netherlands (trial member since October 2008).

In 2009, five groups applied to join the movement. They therefore joined the Europe Region as trial members. UK groups: Emmaus Burnley, Emmaus Gateshead, Emmaus Ipswich, Emmaus Rugby, Emmaus South Wales and Emmaus Norwich.

Three French groups also became full members: Les Papillons d'Emmaüs

(Reunion Island), SOS Familles Emmaüs Tarn Nord and Emmaüs Action Ouest.

At the end of the statutory trial period and with the favourable opinion of the

Regional Council of Emmaus Europe, the EI April 2009 board meeting in Beirut decided to accept **Emmaus Rzeszow (Poland) as a full member of Emmaus International.**

IV. CONCLUSIONS AND WORK ORIENTATIONS

2008 and 2009 period were key years for the consolidation of EE in the eyes of the grassroots groups and the Movement's bodies.

Straightening out the finances and having an accounts system in working order enabled the work needed to implement a number of initiatives to be accomplished without any major financial concerns.

The SEE was very involved in both following up the issue of migration and the preparation of the sustainable development camp.

The arrival of the two new members of staff at the SEE and the handover was fluid, without the groups noticing a change in the quality of the secretariat's work.

As it does every year, the SEE monitored the regional container programme.

The participation of the French national delegate and French EI elected representatives in the Emmaus France regional meetings is an encouraging sign with regard to the commitment of the French groups to the construction of the Europe Region.

The three undertakings made at the Strasbourg 2007 RAEE were monitored throughout the year. To date, the following results have been achieved: European-level events (Ferrara and Lisbon), improving communication in the region (launch of the website) and developing citizen commitments at European level (jointly organising the *Bridges not walls* citizen summit). ; questioning the European Parliament elections candidates in 2009).

The creation of the Emmaus Europe website helped to:

- Raise the profile of Emmaus in Europe, for example providing information about the regional solidarity programme (initiatives needing support and containers).
- Discuss the experiences of the groups and their initiatives via the forums and articles on the website (particularly in the Regional Life section).

A significant amount of work was done.

2009 is an important year for Emmaus Europe.

It is the year of the Regional Assembly of Emmaus Europe from 16-18 October in Brussels and the 60th anniversary of the founding of Emmaus. These events will provide an opportunity to meet with grassroots groups.

The next RAEE in October in Brussels will be the chance to highlight the work carried out by Emmaus Europe in relation to the European Union.

As we know only too well, European construction fails due to a relative lack of citizen involvement in a joint political forum that is still being created. This means that there is a need for increased citizen participation in community issues beyond our borders.

In order to have a real influence on the European policies that are increasingly shaping our future but forget the weakest members of society, Emmaus Europe is counting on the involvement of all the European groups. There will be many issues at stake at the assembly and there are also a large number of work prospects for the region.

Should Emmaus Europe join work networks at European level? Should the Europe Region monitor issues specific to the Emmaus Movement? How should we question MEPs - on what issues? How should this be done? These are just some of the issues that have not yet been addressed and need to be debated in Brussels.
